Message from the Head



Dear families,

As we reflect on the first part of 2026, it has been a half term full of energy, ambition and community at Mayfield. We began the year with an INSET day that brought staff together in community circles and focused on strengthening our curriculum, refining our Teaching and Learning Toolkit, and continuing the implementation of our reading strategy. This work reflects our shared commitment to ambition for every child and to continually improving the experiences and outcomes we provide.

It has been a pleasure to welcome students back into school and see how quickly they re-established routines with positivity and focus. Across both primary and secondary phases, the respect and inclusion shown through the way students support one another has been a real strength of the term and continues to define our school community.

Learning and development have remained at the heart of our work. In the primary phase, our partnership with Rivers C of E Trust has supported strong inclusive practice, with learning walks highlighting effective strategies such as choral response, partnered talk and cold calling to ensure high expectations and participation for all. In secondary, assemblies and classroom practice have focused on our literacy drive, moving into the next phase of Reading in Action. Through reading aloud, thinking aloud and explicit vocabulary teaching, we are building confident readers, speakers and learners.

This term has also provided many opportunities beyond the classroom. Residential experiences, such as the Year 4 visit to Minstead, demonstrated our values in action, with students embracing challenge, supporting one another and showing respect for their environment. Parents' and carers' evenings, SEND review meetings and ongoing collaboration with organisations such as Portsmouth Parent Voices

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have strengthened our inclusive partnerships with families and ensured that every child receives the support they need to thrive.

The arts have been a particular highlight this term. Dance Live has showcased the creativity, teamwork and determination of our children across both phases. We are incredibly proud of our secondary team for achieving an outstanding second place in a highly competitive field, and our primary team as they took to the stage and demonstrated great skill by performing a range of dance genres. These performances, along with in-school showcases, have been powerful examples of our values -ambition, inclusion and respect in action.

We were also delighted to welcome the Deputy Director of Education for Children, Families and Education, whose visit and highly complementary feedback recognised the significant progress being made and the positive relationships that underpin our school.

Thank you to our staff, students, families and volunteers for your continued support and commitment. Together, we are creating a school community where ambition is nurtured, inclusion is embedded and respect is lived every day. We look forward to the opportunities ahead as we continue to believe, achieve and succeed together.

Paul shared a powerful first-hand account of his experiences during the Holocaust, alongside reflections from his son, Richard, on growing up as the child of a survivor and the importance of passing these stories on to future generations. The session deepened students' understanding of history, resilience, remembrance, and human rights. We are proud of the maturity and attentiveness shown by students throughout this meaningful learning experience.

Throughout this week, our students have been learning more about the Holocaust within activities and assemblies and weaving their knowledge into their learning.




National Storytelling Week

Get ready for the future you want.

We started this half term in our tutor groups by discussing Career Education, different types of qualifications, what they can lead to, and the academic pathways students may follow when they leave Mayfield. This provides a powerful opportunity to explore career options in a low-pressure, supportive environment.

In addition, we took our Year 7 students to the University of Portsmouth, where they had the opportunity to work with and get to know a variety of local employers. They also began thinking about the many positive qualities and skills they could offer a future employer.

We have also started discussions with our Year 10 students about College Taster Days taking place in the summer term. They attended their first assembly with the City of Portsmouth College, where staff explained how the system works and what will be offered as part of the taster courses. Additionally, students have begun their one-to-one careers appointments with our careers adviser to discuss the options available to them when they leave Mayfield.

During our most recent Personal Development Day, the theme was “Meet an Employer”. All year groups had the opportunity to speak with a range of employers who visited Mayfield School and shared advice on current labour market demands and the transferable skills students need to develop to be employable.


May I mention that it seems some parents are not receiving Class Charts notifications as frequently as they should. Whilst we are working on this issue,

Year R

What a Wonderful Half-Term!

Wow, what a whirlwind of a half term it has been! It's hard to believe how much we've packed in since returning from the Christmas holidays. The children have settled back beautifully, and we have loved diving straight into our new topic: Winter.

Over the past few weeks, we've explored all things chilly. The children have learned about winter weather, seasonal changes, Arctic animals, and so much more. The recent frosty mornings have certainly helped bring our learning to life! There has been so much excitement as the children spotted real life signs of winter all around them.

We have also been fully immersed in Drawing Club, and we couldn't be prouder of the children's enthusiasm and developing writing skills. This half term, we have explored a wonderful range of texts and video clips, including:

- We're Going on a Bear Hunt
- The Dot
- The Great Race
- Chitty Chitty Bang Bang

Each story has sparked imagination, storytelling, creativity, and some brilliant markmaking and writing.

The weather certainly hasn't stopped the children's curiosity! They have absolutely loved investigating ice and frost outdoors, noticing textures, patterns, and the way things change when they melt. And of course... there may have been one or two muddy puddles involved along the way!

Year 1

This half-term has flown by, and Year 1 have been incredibly busy, learning and exploring so much over the past six weeks.

The children have continued to enjoy Drawing Club this half term, and it's been wonderful to see their confidence and independence growing. They are beginning to take real ownership of their ideas, and we've been so impressed with the ambitious vocabulary and descriptive adjectives appearing in their sentences. Their creativity is really shining.

In Maths, the children have been building their understanding of part–part–whole models, using them to explore how numbers can be made and broken apart. We have now moved on to addition and subtraction through “First, Then, Now” stories. The children have enjoyed using practical resources and storytelling to make sense of these new concepts.

This half term, we have been recapping some of our previously taught sounds in Phonics, and the children are doing brilliantly. Their confidence in recognising and using these sounds is really growing.

Science has been exciting this half-term, with the children exploring materials and their properties. They learned new vocabulary such as transparent and opaque and especially enjoyed our waterproof experiment to find the best material for the little pigs' house.

In Geography, the children turned their attention to our planet, learning about the equator, the North Pole, South Pole, deserts and the rainforest. They loved comparing these places and discussing how their climates differ.

Computing lessons have given the children plenty of opportunities to problem-solve, as they learned to program Bee-Bots. They practised giving clear instructions and worked hard to debug their code when things didn't go quite as expected.

PE has been all about developing strength, balance, and control, with the children practising shapes, balances, hops, and beginning to build towards handstands and cartwheels. They rounded off the unit by creating short routines that showcased all their new skills.

Music has been wonderfully creative, as the children combined everything they've learned so far to produce an underwater-themed performance. Using instruments, singing, and body percussion, they worked together to create an atmosphere and tell a story through sound.

We are incredibly proud of the children's hard work, curiosity, and enthusiasm this half-term. We can't wait to see what they achieve in the next half term! Thank you as always for your continued support and we hope you all have a lovely week off!

Year 2

What a truly exciting, engaging and memorable half term we have enjoyed in Year 2! It is hard to believe that we are already halfway through the school year, and the progress the children have made since September has been wonderful to see. They have shown fantastic enthusiasm for their learning and have impressed us daily with their curiosity, creativity and determination. It has been a pleasure to watch them grow in confidence across all areas of the curriculum.

In History, the children have absolutely loved taking a deep dive into the fascinating story of the Mary Rose. They thoroughly enjoyed learning about King Henry VIII and discovering what life was like during Tudor times. This topic really captured their imaginations and sparked many thoughtful discussions and questions. Our learning was wonderfully brought to life during our school trip to the Mary Rose Museum, where

the children took part in engaging workshops and were amazed to see the Mary Rose with their very own eyes. This was a truly special experience and one that the children have spoken about with great excitement. It has been clear to see just how much they have loved this topic.

In writing, the children have been working incredibly hard and producing some fantastic pieces of work. They wrote a detailed non-chronological report all about materials and their properties, carefully using ambitious and topic-specific vocabulary throughout. In addition to this, the children wrote an exciting and formal invitation to the King, inviting him to visit our wonderful Gallery of Achievement. They took great pride in their writing, focusing on presentation, sentence structure and vocabulary, and the results have been something to celebrate.


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In Reading, the children have been thoroughly enjoying their guided reading sessions and have loved exploring a wide range of books together as a class. We have spent time looking deeply into texts, sharing ideas and discussing our thoughts. Two favourites have been *The Street Beneath Our Feet* and *Coming to England*, both of which sparked great interest and curiosity. The children have worked extremely hard to develop their retrieval, summarising and prediction skills, showing increasing confidence in explaining their answers and using evidence from the text to support their ideas.

In Maths, we have been exploring a variety of methods to help the children confidently learn and understand the 2, 5 and 10 times tables. The children have enjoyed solving a range of problems and deepening their understanding through mathematical journaling. This has allowed them to explain their thinking clearly and develop strong reasoning skills, showing resilience and perseverance when faced with challenges.

Year 3

Dear Parents and Carers,

What a fantastic half term we have had in Year 3! The children have worked incredibly hard across all subjects, and we are so proud of the progress they have made and the enthusiasm they bring to their learning each day.

In science, the children have been exploring forces and magnets. They especially enjoyed investigating how objects move on different surfaces and discovering which materials are magnetic. Their projects were creative, thoughtful, and a pleasure to see.

In English, the children wrote imaginative stories about animals facing problems, and these were engaging, well-structured, and full of brilliant ideas. They also applied their geography knowledge of the United Kingdom to write non-chronological reports about famous UK landmarks, showing a strong understanding of both writing skills and geographical features.

We have also been incredibly impressed with how enthusiastically the children have thrown themselves into our Times Tables Rock Stars battle. Their determination, teamwork, and consistent effort have been wonderful to see, and we are very proud of the progress they are making with their times tables.

We have continued to develop our singing with our music specialist, and the children have particularly enjoyed performing our lively Vikings song each week. Their confidence and teamwork during music lessons have been lovely to watch.

In PE, the children learned a variety of skills needed for basketball, including dribbling, passing, and working cooperatively as a team. They also benefited from sessions with a specialist tennis coach, which they thoroughly enjoyed and approached with great enthusiasm.

Thank you for your continued support throughout the half term. We hope you all have a wonderful and restful break, and we look forward to welcoming the children back for an exciting Spring 2.

Year 4

We cannot believe how quickly Spring 1 has flown by! It has been a busy and exciting half term for Year 4 in both Mississippi and Yangtze Class, and we are incredibly proud of all the hard work the children have shown.

Mathematics

In Maths, we have been focusing on developing efficient strategies to learn our 3, 6, 9 and 7 times tables, alongside the related division facts. The children have been applying this knowledge daily through games such as Daily 10 and Times Tables Rock Stars (TTRS), which they thoroughly enjoy. We have also been strengthening our reasoning and problem-solving skills by tackling a range of challenging questions linked to multiplication and division.

Writing

In Writing, the children have been exploring the features of newspaper reports. They have learned how to use first and third person, write in the past tense, use speech marks for quotations, and include alliteration for effect. Using these tools, they planned and wrote their own newspaper articles reporting on the recent cold weather conditions. We have been very impressed with their creativity and application of these skills.

Reading

Our class text this half term has been Varjak Paw. The story follows a young Mesopotamian blue kitten navigating the challenges of a big, unknown city in order to save his family. The children are thoroughly enjoying this exciting and adventurous story and have been developing their comprehension skills by answering a wide range of questions to deepen their understanding.

History

In History, we have been learning about the Viking invasion of Anglo-Saxon Britain. The children explored the reasons behind the Viking invasions and gained an understanding of how this period shaped British history.

Religious Education

In RE, we have been learning about stewardship

within Christianity. We discussed what it means to care for the Earth and why Christians believe this is important, as people made in God's image.

Physical Education

In PE, the children have been developing their skills in netball and rugby. They have shown excellent teamwork, determination and sportsmanship.

Music

We have been very fortunate to have Mrs Hart joining us in Music this half term. The children have been developing their vocal skills and have been learning to sing "Consider Yourself" from Oliver Twist. We look forward to seeing their continued progress.

Year 4 Residential

A real highlight of this half term was the Year 4 residential visit to Minstead Study Centre. The children demonstrated fantastic independence and resilience while taking part in activities such as orienteering, fire starting, forest walks and preparing their own meals. It was a wonderful opportunity for them to challenge themselves, build confidence and create lasting memories.

Caribbean's Class Assembly was a true celebration of the children's enthusiasm and teamwork.


They performed with confidence and joy, and it was wonderful to see them share their learning with such pride.

With Christmas a distant memory and January seeming like it was to never end, here we are at the February half term and mid school year point already. We have had a busy start to the new academic year and really rising to the challenges ahead of us. Here is a snippet of what we have been learning.

In reading, we have been reading *Skellig*, by David Almond, following the story of Michael, who has just moved into a house in need of renovation, with his mother, father and unwell baby sister. With his parents focused on his baby sister, Michael finds that they do not really have the time for him and he explores the overgrown garden of the new house, leading to a dilapidated garage. In the garage, Michael discovers Skellig, a being seemingly crossed between a human and an owl. We have followed them through the themes of family, change, friendship and trust. We empathised with Michael and discussed the differences between him and Skellig, using information from the text.

In writing, we started the half-term writing a third person extended narrative text, based on a disaster. We based our writing on visual stimulus, using extracts from the film 'Impossible', based on the true story of the 2004 Boxing Day Indian Ocean Tsunami disaster. This helped us to create some powerful and emotive writing, with plenty of opportunities to advance the action and story through character dialogue and description. We have developed our skills in adding in adventure, using parenthesis and the vary ways to punctuate this, as well as varying sentence types for effect and using the past and past progressive tenses. We finished the half term writing an explanation text about Tsunami's, allowing us to apply our Geography skills from last half term when we studied volcanoes and earthquakes. We were able to use higher level and precise vocabulary, key facts, non-fiction text organisational features, along with visual prompts, to support the reader, such as, labels, diagrams and maps.

In maths, we are now well into our SATs revision curriculum, as well as ensuring the Year 6 curriculum coverage. We started the half term

with place value and knowledge of the number system. We have covered a range of calculations using place value to help us, with numbers up to 8-digits. We then re-visited the properties of 2D and 3D shapes, including measuring area and perimeter, and angles. We then focused on symmetry before moving on to position and direction, using grids with 4 quadrants. We have covered interpreting statistics through graphs and charts, applying our knowledge of angles and percentages, as well as working out mean averages. We then studied ratio and scale before ending the half term with multiplication and division calculation work.

In Science, we have been learning all about light. We have been learning that light travels in straight lines, how shadows are formed, refraction, Sir Isaac Newton's discovery of the colour wheel and how spectrums work, and how we see objects in the colours that we do. We have worked scientifically in carrying out experiments about angles of reflection and the types of surfaces that make the best reflectors.

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Primary News - Year 6

In History, we have been learning all about the Windrush generation, who travelled to Britain after World War II, between 1948 and 1971, from Caribbean commonwealth countries, to help rebuild Britain. We have learnt about the challenges (against expectations) they faced through segregation, the significant contributions made by them to Britain and the history of the Caribbean islands, from the early discovery of them by Christopher Columbus in 1494.

In PE we have been learning to line dance. Although not an 'authentically original' line dancing tune, we have enjoyed learning the moves to Steps' 5,6,7,8! In French, with Madame Humphries, we have been learning about describing our appearance and naming body parts. We also had the amazing opportunity to join some of our peers from the seniors in watching a play performed in French!

Thank you for your continued support and please keep encouraging your child to complete home learning tasks set, along with their times tables and corresponding division facts, and their reading and completing of AR quizzes. Have a great week ahead!
